Irish Society of Gynaecological Oncology Public and Patient Involvement Group (ISGOPPI)

Origins

The Irish Society of Gynaecological Oncology (ISGO) re-established in Dec 2015. The society is an all-Ireland venture encompassing all gynaecological cancers. Its members are lead clinicians, nurse specialists, scientists and allied health working in the area of Gynaecology Oncology in Ireland. They meet several times a year. The society will focus on the full continuum of cancer care; from prevention to diagnosis, treatment, survivorship and palliation.

What is PPI?

The society realised the importance of including the Patient and Public voice in the management of all aspects of Gynaecological Oncology. The term "public" refers to potential patients, significant others and people who use health and social care services as well as people from organisations that represent people who use these services. The Society would like that its PPI group would play a role in improving Patient Experiences and Clinical Research but not exclusively just these areas. Our hope is that by having a partnership with our patients, we can achieve more as a group and you have a better Patient Experience.

Commitment

The group aim to meet 3 times a year and correspondence is mainly through email. A number of our members are involved in national and international committees and further education around PPI.

ISGOPPI Co-founders

Yvonne O'Meara and Sharon O'Toole established and run the ISGOPPI. Yvonne is a Systemic Psychotherapist & Psycho-Social Oncologist. Yvonne has worked in the area of psycho social oncology and palliative care since 2004 in teaching hospitals in Ireland and in North America. She has recently taken up a post at the University College Dublin School of Medicine as Women's Cancer Survivorship Research Coordinator based in the Mater hospital.

Sharon is a Senior Research Fellow in Trinity College Dublin working in the area of gynaecological cancer. Her research focuses on early diagnosis and better treatments. Sharon works closely with a number of ovarian cancer charities in Ireland and coordinates the national awareness events in Ireland for gynaecological cancer.

European Network of Gynecological Cancer Advocacy Groups (Engage)

ISGOPPI is a member of the Engage network which is part of the European Society of Gynaecological Oncology (ESGO). The Engage network has a number of ongoing projects and committees that our members now sit on. ISGOPPI has a representative on the clinical trials project. The Clinical Trial project headed by Birthe Lemley and in cooperation with ENGOT is ongoing, with some delays due to the pandemic. A study book on clinical trials is being prepared to help patients understand more about clinical trials and how they work.

Engage has also established cancer specific committees and ISGOPPI members sit on some of these.

Engage Survey

Many of the ISGOPPI members took part in a survey run by Engage to assess the impact of COVID on gynaecological cancer patients across European countries. The results were recently published and acknowledge ISGOPPI for their contribution.


Marie Keating organised the first virtual BRCA seminar



Achievements

- Representation on The National Guidelines for Ovarian Cancer.
- PPI led research on Doctor Patient Communication published in the Irish Medical Journal Summer 2019.
- Members have represented the ISGOPPI at National and International meetings.
- Members of the European Network of Gynaecological Cancer Patient Advocacy Groups (ENGAGe) and World Gynaecological Oncology (GO) Day working group.
- Feedback to research groups on design of studies, content of patient information leaflets and circulation of findings.
- Participating in "Life Beyond Cancer" focus groups.
- Influencing change in programmes such as the Irish Cancer Society's Women's Health Initiative.

The society aims to meet twice a year, the location rotates around Ireland and often coincides with an ISGO scientific meeting.

6. Women's Health Initiative

The Irish Cancer Society in 2020 established the Women's Health Initiative (WHI). It's aim is to improve health and wellbeing for women living with and beyond cancer through the establishment of pilot clinics based in Cork and Dublin. The clinics will involve initial groups of selected participants. As you maybe aware Sharon and I both work within the area of women's health. I was successful in a recent interview and was appointed Women's Cancer Survivorship Research Coordinator. This post is part of the WHI appointed by UCD School of Medicine. I find myself in an extremely fortunate position where the research that we are conducting has strong ISGOPPI input from the very start. I was appointed in October 2020 and since this time we have formed two working groups compiling of 5 members of the ISGOPPI in each group, conducted three workshops attached to two projects and have had ISGOPPI input on all other projects attached to the Dublin based WHI. I would like to take this opportunity to say a massive thank you for all your input so far, we listen to what you say and we are acting on it. I look forward to working with you in 2021.

Two specific projects that the ISGOPPI have been involved in are below.

The Diagnosis Delivery project

Survivorship begins on diagnosis, the delivery and information shared of a new diagnosis of cancer is particularly important to patients. Managed correctly it can have a positive impact on their ability to cope with what lies ahead. When this phase is managed well it sets the tone for future care and can build up trust between patient and care provider. Currently there is limited structure to support staff during this phase of a diagnosis. The Diagnosis Delivery (DD) project will aim to support staff and women in a more organised manner, so that diagnosis is delivered in a clear and compassionate manner. Particular focus will be placed on the act of delivering a diagnosis to a patient; when is it performed in their disease journey, how is the information delivered, what information is shared at this time and how is that information retained by the patient and/or their significant others.

Virtual Passport

Our objective is to develop a personalised treatment summary and passport for women with individualised information for each patient based on their disease site, stage and treatment modalities received using a virtual platform. Once developed this platform will be scalable to many other cancer types. Phase one of this project will focus on cervical cancer. Our long-term goal is to create an interactive mobile enabled webpage where any woman impacted by gynaecological cancer and breast cancer can access and enter their personalised medical history and treatment plan. Depending on their symptoms an individual virtual passport outlining resource and solutions both local and national will be made available to the individual women. This will include a range of resources within their area/region, podcasts/educational videos and peer support. The main aim is to empower those women with information, information that they can access in their own time and that is relevant to them. This platform will also offer support to the wider family system.



7. Laura Brennan Award

The Irish Society of Gyanecological Oncology (ISGO) put out a call for nominations for the Laura Brennan Award. Laura had received the inaugural award in Belfast in 2018 for her endless campaign for the HPV vaccine. Joan Moore was a worthy recipient of the award in 2019. With Laura, it was decided that the Laura Brennan Award would be presented on an annual basis by the ISGO to a patient or member of the public as a recognition of outstanding achievement in the areas of gynecological oncology patient advocacy and or patient and public involvement in research.

ISGO received a number of nominations and with the ISGO committee, a representative from our PPI group and Laura's parents Bernie and Larry, it was decided that Jacqueline Daly (member of ISGOPPI) was a worthy recipient for this years award. A presentation will be organised when restrictions allow.

Jacqueline co-founded East Galway & Midlands Cancer Support in 2012 and is now Director of Services, as well as a patient advocate and campaigner, bringing awareness to local and national government agencies. She is an active member of the ISGOPPI and patient representative on the board of the Society of Sexual Medicine Ireland. She is also secretary of the board of the European Cancer Patients Coalition (ECPC). She has contributed to the ECPC Publication 'Living Well During Cancer Treatment', wrote the Structured Education Programme (STEP) to support men with Prostate Cancer and participated in ESMO Rare Cancer Patient Advocate Training in Milan 2018 and spoke at the ESMO Conference in Munich 2018. On top of this she is a complimentary therapist in Bio Energy, Healing Touch, Indian Head Massage, Reiki, Rahanni and a developer and presenter of community outreach programmes, including facilitator for Survive and Thrive Self-Management programme for Cancer Survivors run by the National Cancer Control Programme in Ireland. She is a facilitator of the Climb program for children between age 5 – 12.

Both Jacqueline and her husband Mike had cancer and know both as carers and as patients how important proper support and information is. The Cancer Patients voice must be heard. Jacqueline is a worthy recipient of the 2020 Laura Brennan Award.
